
DEDICATION

GUIDELINES FOR COMPLETING AN ENTRY BLANK

- We urge all to exhibit, but only exhibitors living in the following towns may enter for premiums: Dover, Halifax, Marlboro, Readsboro, Searsburg, South Newfane, Stamford, Stratton, Wardsboro, Whitingham, Williamsville & Wilmington. Livestock from herds outside member towns may compete for prizes.
- Be sure to include all articles being considered for exhibit on your entry blank. Entries may be deleted at the last minute, but none may be added or exchanged.
- 3. Unless otherwise specified, only 2 items may be entered per lot.
- 4. No telephone entries will be accepted.
- 5. Include all necessary information on your entry blank:
 - a. Class Letter
 - b. Lot Number
 - c. Description of article
 - d. Anyone entering livestock need only inform the Supt. by August 20th with the number of animals being entered.
- 6. Give complete name, mailing address and town of residence (if different).

- Mail completed ADULT entry blanks to: D.V.F.D.A., PO Box 577, Wilmington, VT 05363 post marked by Friday, August 17, 2007 or deliver to Chittenden Bank in Wilmington. First Adult Entry received will be sent two Complementary Passes to the 2007 Farmers' Day Fair!
- 8. Mail completed YOUTH entry blanks to: D.V.F.D.A., PO Box 577, Wilmington, VT 05363 post marked by Friday, August 17, 2007 or deliver to Chittenden Bank in Wilmington. Be sure age is included. Youth exhibitors must be 17 years of age or younger. First Youth Entry received will be sent two Complementary Passes to the 2007 Farmers' Day Fair!
- 9. Coloring Contest: Must be 17 years of age or younger. Only Youths entering other exhibits may enter Coloring Contest. The Coloring Contest picture is located next to the Entry Forms and must be filled out and attached to an Entry Form. Winners of the contest shall receive a Complementary Bracelet for Thursday night's Bracelet Frenzy!
- 10. All exhibits must have been produced, made or grown by the exhibitor. All entries in food (canned and vegetables) must be made or grown within the past twelve (12) months. Containers may be opened for judging. No articles previously exhibited will be accepted. Livestock is excluded from this rule.
- 11. Exhibits may be entered in only one lot.
- 12. Exhibits that do not meet the required standards are ineligible for individual prizes.
- 13. Youth exhibits will be judged according to class and age group.
- 14. All exhibits, except livestock, must be placed between 3:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. on Thursday, August 23, or 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. on Friday, August 24.
- **15. Youth & Adult exhibitors must pick up exhibits at 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 25.** Youth Premiums are paid 5:30 6:00 p.m. and Adult Premiums are paid from 6:00 6:30 p.m. on Saturday.
- 16. Any premium not picked up by 7:00 p.m. Saturday, August 25, and totaling \$10.00 or less will revert back to DVFDA. Other premium money will be mailed within one month.

Due precautions will be taken for the safety of all exhibits, but the Association will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

JUDGING

Judging will start at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, August 24. All buildings will be closed at this time and will open at 4:30 p.m. The Fair Association provides all judges.

All exhibits must be made 100% by exhibitors or they will be disqualified.

All entries will be judged on quality and standards as determined by the judges.

Winning entries will be marked as follows:

1st Blue Ribbon 2nd Red Ribbon 3rd White Ribbon

The awarding of prizes is entirely at the discretion of the judges and their decisions are final.

EXHIBITORS RAFFLE

All persons exhibiting at least one item (Classes A - S or Photo Contest) will be eligible for a special drawing and must sign up when picking up entry cards. Top prize for the adult drawing will be a \$100 certificate towards your bill from Scotts Clean Sweep. Other prizes will be awarded. Top prize for the youth drawing will be a \$25 gift certificate from Fireside True Value in Wilmington. Other prizes will be awarded. Winners will be announced when premiums are picked up on Saturday.

QUILT RAFFLE

A colorful scrap quilt made by Maple Country Quilters will be on display in the needlework area in the high school cafeteria. (Raffle tickets for this quilt can be purchased there for \$1.00 each or 6 for \$5.00.) Drawing will be held at 4 p.m. in Floral Hall on Saturday, August 25th. Proceeds from the raffle will benefit the Maple Country Quilters, who have for many years displayed their work for all to enjoy, and the Deerfield Valley Farmers' Day Fair. The quilt is approximately 76 x 84 inches and machine quilted. It is a pieced quilt composed of "Bingo" blocks set in a black background.

MYRON ALLEN GARDENER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This award is given to the adult exhibitor who receives the most blue ribbons in Class D, Class E (lots 2, 4, 6 and 7), Class H, Class J and Class N (lots 1 - 34). Awarded at 4 p.m. in Floral Hall on Saturday, August 25.

GREAT COOK AWARD

This award is given to the adult exhibitor who has received the most blue ribbons in Class L and Class M. Awarded at 4 p.m. in Floral Hall on Saturday, August 25.

SPECIAL EVENTS

GENERAL RULES

Statutes concerning the use of alcohol are in effect for both competitors and spectators. Participants may be disqualified if it is determined that he/she is consuming alcoholic beverages. Statutes concerning public intoxication will be strictly enforced for all fairgoers.

Sensible precautions for safety are expected from all exhibitors. The DVFDA and its committees will not be responsible for any accident that may occur to any animal or person at this competition. Competitors are responsible for any animals, thereby releasing the DVFDA from any damages whatsoever.

PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST

This contest is judged by itself and no premium money is paid to the exhibitor. If you are interested in receiving premiums, please see Class R, FINE ARTS.

Divisions in each category: Black & White Color

Categories:

- 1. Nature: Showing plants, flowers and animals in their natural habitat.
- 2. Pictorial: Scenic, landscapes, etc.
- 3. Farm: Pertaining to farm or rural life or farm scenes.
- 4. Unusual (nature or farm): This will be judged on rarity, not technical quality.
- 5. Pets
- 6. Faces of Vermont: Vermonters at work or play.
- 7. The Fair: Pictures taken at last year's Farmers' Day Fair.
- 8. My Town: Illustrating people, situations or scenery of the DVFDA member towns.
- 9. Cultivated plant: Either outdoor or indoor, single or in a garden.

Prizes: A \$20 cash prize will be awarded for Best of Show. Ribbons and gift certificates, or cash prizes will be awarded in each division.

Rules:

- * Contest is open to residents of member towns (see guidelines at the beginning of this booklet). Photos must be taken in Vermont during the last five years and not previously exhibited at the Fair.
- * No more than two entries in each division will be judged.
- * Photos must be a minimum of 5" x 7" and must be matted and/or framed and ready to hang with hook or wire. Framing will affect judging only if it greatly enhances or distracts from the photo.
- * Each entry must be clearly marked on the back with name, address and phone number of the photographer and the category in which it is entered. If photographer is under 18, age should be noted.

To Enter: Photos must be brought to the Fairgrounds in **Floral Hall** on Thursday, August 23rd between 3:00 - 8:30 p.m. or Friday, August 24th between 8:00 - 9:30 a.m. Photos and prizes must be picked up between 6:00 - 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 25th. Judging will take place on Friday, August 24th. All decisions of the judges are final.

CLASS A CATTLE DEPARTMENT DAIRY AND BEEF

ALL CATTLE MUST BE SUPERVISED AT ALL TIMES. Adult and youth will show their animals at the same time. Animals must be shown in the ring to be judged. Exhibitors should bring their own watering pails. There shall not be more than two entries in any one class by the same owner. Cattle must come from herds known to be free from common contagious diseases. Only disease-free cattle are permitted entry.

NOTE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 5 months of the event, Rabies vaccine between 30 days and 12 months for animals over 3 months of age, and Shipping fever vaccination between 14 days and 6 months prior to the event are required. Out of state cattle imported into Vermont also require official individual identification and an import permit with a CVI dated within 30 days of entry.

Exhibitors are encouraged to leave their animals until 3:00 p.m. Saturday for the fair-goers to enjoy.

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EXCERPT FROM REUNION BOOKLET 1890

The Wilmington Agricultural Society

This society is one of the oldest and has, ever since it was first organized, been called one of the best and most prosperous organizations of the kind in the State. So great was its reputation that about the year 1860 Judge Collamer said at the State Fair at Rutland, "Wilmington has beaten the State every time."

The society was organized about 1850, and with the exception of two years, has held an exhibition every year since-the exhibition this year being the thirty-eighth since its organization. Soon after the society was organized the town was divided into two sections called the Eastern and Northern. Each provided themselves with a large wagon-The Eastern forty and the Northern thirty feet long-covered with white cloth, with red and blue curtains, and usually trimmed with evergreens. These wagons freighted with joyous maids, matrons, and little folks and drawn by all the oxen which could be gathered from each section and lead by the Wilmington Cornet Band (which is still in a flourishing condition) was usually the great feature of the day. Much good-natured strife was aroused between the two sections for the honor of having the best and largest team. In 1859 the records show that the Northern team had sixty-one pairs of oxen, and the Eastern fifty-three pairs-one hundred and fourteen in all. It has ever been the object of the society to strive to excel in everything, and it would seem that the motto which floated over the wagon from the North, "This is the best that we can do, In eighteen hundred and fifty-two," had ever been the motto of the society. These wagons were run until 1878, when on account of there being less oxen kept, many farmers using horses instead, they were discontinued.

Although in later years there has not been as good and exhibition of oxen, it has been made up by the increased exhibit of young stock. The exhibit of 1888 was universally considered as one of the best in the history of the society. Within the last few years the low price of stock and the high price of horses has led many to increase their stock of horses, and now the need of a place suitable to show our horses and colts in connection with our cattle was felt.

It would seem that one of the best proofs of the push and determination of the people of Wilmington is in the fact that in all this time visitors have never been charged a penny for admission to the fairs, and whenever any money was needed to pay expenses the people have bountifully supplied it when asked. It has been no present pecuniary return which has induced the farmers to so nobly sustain them, as no money premiums were available, and the honor of having the best was the reward for which all sought, trusting that the advantage so obtained would return a reward in the future. During the past two years subscription papers have been circulated and money raised, which has been divided into money premiums by the society. This has added not a little interest, and makes it more of an object for our farmers to bring out their neat stock, and should the money premiums continue to be offered we look for a larger exhibit and better fairs in the future.
