GUIDELINES FOR COMPLETING AN ENTRY BLANK

The entry blank may be downloaded at www.dvfair.com

- We urge all to exhibit, but only exhibitors living in the following towns may enter for premiums: Dover, Halifax, Marlboro, Newfane, Readsboro, Searsburg, Somerset, Stamford, Stratton, Townshend, Wardsboro, Whitingham, & Wilmington. Livestock from herds outside member towns may compete for prizes.
- Be sure to include all articles being considered for exhibit on your entry blank. Entries may be deleted at the last minute, but none may be added or exchanged.
- 3. Unless otherwisw specified, only 2 items may be entered per lot.
- 4. No telephone entries will be accepted.
- 5. Include all necessary information on your entry blank:
 - Class Letter
 - b. Lot Number
 - c. Description of article
 - d. Anyone entering livestock need only inform the Supt. by August 18th with the number of animals being entered.
- 6. Give complete name, mailing address and town of residence (if different).

- 7. Mail completed ADULT entry blanks to: DVFDA, PO Box 577, Wilmington, VT 05363 post marked by Friday, August 15, 2008 or deliver to Chittenden Bank in Wilmington. First Adult Entry received will be sent two Complementary Passes to the 2008 Farmers' Day Fair!
- 8. Mail completed YOUTH entry blanks to: DVFDA, PO Box 577, Wilmington, VT 05363 post marked by Friday, August 15, 2008 or deliver to Chittenden Bank in Wilmington. Be sure age is included. Youth exhibitors must be 17 years of age or younger. First Youth Entry received will be sent two Complementary Passes to the 2008 Farmers' Day Fair!
- 9. Coloring Contest: Must be 17 years of age or younger. Only Youths entering other exhibits may enter Coloring Contest. The Coloring Contest picture is located next to the Entry Forms and must be filled out and attached to an Entry Form. Winners of the contest shall receive a Complementary Bracelet for Thursday night's Bracelet Frenzy!
- 10. All exhibits must have been produced, made or grown by the exhibitor. All entries in food (canned and vegetables) must be made or grown within the past twelve (12) months. Containers may be opened for judging. No articles previously exhibited will be accepted. Livestock is excluded from this rule.
- 11. Exhibits may be entered in only one lot.
- 12. Exhibits that do not meet the required standards are ineligible for individual prizes.
- 13. Youth exhibits will be judged according to class and age group.
- 14. All exhibits, except livestock, must be placed between 3:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. on Thursday, August 21, or 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. on Friday, August 22.
- **15. Youth & Adult exhibitors must pick up exhibits at 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 23.** Youth Premiums are paid on Saturday from 6:00 6:30 p.m. at the C.C. Haynes Building and Adult Premiums are paid from 6:00 6:30 p.m. at the Fair Office.
- 16. Any premium not picked up by 7:00 p.m. Saturday, August 23, and totaling \$10.00 or less will revert back to DVFDA. Other premium money will be mailed within one month.

Due precautions will be taken for the safety of all exhibits, but the Association will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

JUDGING

Judging will start at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, August 22. All buildings will be closed at this time and will open at 4:30 p.m. The Fair Association provides all judges.

All exhibits must be made 100% by exhibitors or they will be disqualified.

All entries will be judged on quality and standards as determined by the judges.

Winning entries will be marked as follows:

1st Blue Ribbon 2nd Red Ribbon 3rd White Ribbon

The awarding of prizes is entirely at the discretion of the judges and their decisions are final.

EXHIBITORS RAFFLE

All persons exhibiting at least one item (Classes A - S or Photo Contest) will be eligible for a special drawing and must sign up when picking up entry cards. Top prize for the adult drawing will be a \$100 certificate towards your bill from Scotts Clean Sweep. Other prizes will be awarded. Top prize for the youth drawing will be a \$25 gift certificate from Fireside True Value in Wilmington. Other prizes will be awarded. Winners will be announced when premiums are picked up on Saturday.

MYRON ALLEN GARDENER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This award is given to the adult exhibitor who receives the most blue ribbons in Class D, Class E (lots 2, 4, 6, 7, and 9), Class H, Class J and Class N (lots 1 - 34). Awarded at 4 p.m. at the Fair Pavilion on Saturday, August 23.

GREAT COOK AWARD

This award is given to the adult exhibitor who has received the most blue ribbons in Class L and Class M. Awarded at 4 p.m. at the Fair Pavilion on Saturday, August 23.



KING ARTHUR BAKING CONTEST

This year the Deerfield Valley Farmers' Day fair is hosting a King Arthur Flour Bake-Off Contest. King Arthur Flour's Blueberry Buckle Coffee Cake is the youth entry and Berries and Cream Cake is the adult entry.

There will be two age categories for youth entries: 8-12 years and 13-17 years. All entries will be judged separately from other prepared food entries. BLUEBERRY BUCKLE COFFEE CAKE

(YOUTH ENTRY ONLY)

BERRIES AND CREAM CAKE (ADULT ENTRY ONLY)

BLUEBERRY BUCKLE COFFEE CAKE (YOUTH ENTRY ONLY)

When you get tired of making the pies, jams, this is an easy and fresh way to put those summer blueberries to use.

Topping

1/3 cup granulated sugar 1/3 cup King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter or margarine

Batter

2 cups King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup granulated sugar

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter or margarine

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup milk

2 cups fresh or frozen blueberries, well drained

First: Preheat your oven to 375°F.

Making the Topping: Mix the sugar, flour and cinnamon in a small bowl. Cut or rub in the butter or margarine with the side of a fork, two knives or your fingertips until it reaches a crumbly state. Set aside.

Making the Batter: Blend the flour, baking powder and salt together in a medium sized mixing bowl. In a large bowl cream together the sugar, butter or margarine, egg and vanilla. Alternately add the milk and the flour mixture to the creamed mixture, ending with flour. Stir only enough to blend. Fold in the blueberries.

Assembling & Baking: Pour the batter into a well-greased and floured, 9-inch cake pan. Sprinkle the topping over the batter and bake for 40 to 45 minutes or until a cake tester or knife comes out clean.

Let the buckle cool for 10 minutes. Loosen the sides with a knife or spatula. Holding the cake pan in your left hand, gently tip the cake out onto your right hand, remove the pan, and gently right the cake onto a serving dish.

BERRIES AND CREAM CAKE (ADULT ENTRY ONLY)

This impressive-looking cake can be made with blueberries, raspberries, black raspberries, wild strawberries — just about any kind of berry you go out and pick on a sunny summer afternoon.

1 1/2 cups (6 3/8 ounces) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour

1/2 cup (3 1/2 ounces) granulated sugar

1/2 cup (1 stick, 4 ounces) unsalted butter or margarine

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 large egg

2 teaspoons vanilla

1 quart berries

2 cups (16 ounces, 1 pint) sour cream

1 large egg

1/2 cup (3 1/2 ounces) granulated sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla

In a medium-sized mixing bowl, combine the flour, sugar, butter or margarine, baking powder, egg and vanilla. Beat till combined; the mixture will be very stiff, and you may need to knead it together by hand at the very end.

Lightly grease a 10-inch spring form or removable-bottom pan. Pat the dough into the bottom of the pan, and spread the berries over the dough.

In a small bowl, beat together the sour cream, egg, sugar and vanilla. Spread this mixture atop the berries.

Place the pan in a preheated 350°F oven and bake the cake for 1 hour, or until the edges are lightly browned. Remove the cake from the oven and cool to room temperature. Serve immediately, or refrigerate until ready to serve. Yield: 16 servings.

Divisions in each category: Black & White Color

Categories:

- 1. Nature: Showing plants, flowers and animals in their natural habitat
- 2. Pictorial: Scenic, landscapes, etc.
- 3. Farm: Pertaining to farm or rural life or farm scenes
- 4. Unusual (nature or farm): This will be judged on rarity, not technical quality (4 x 6 minimum size this division only)
- 5. Pets
- 6. Faces of Vermont: Vermonters at work or play
- 7. The Fair: Pictures taken at last year's Farmers' Day Fair
- 8. My Town: Illustrating people, situations or scenery of the DVFDA member towns
- 9. Cultivated plant: Either outdoor or indoor, single or in a garden
- 10. Sports Activity in Vermont

Prizes: Ribbons and prizes will be awarded in each division.

Rules:

- * Contest is open to residents of member towns (see guidelines at the beginning of this booklet). Photos must be taken in Vermont during the last five years and not previously exhibited at the Fair.
- * No more than two entries in each division will be judged.
- * Photos must be a minimum of 5" x 7" and must be matted and/or framed and ready to hang with hook or wire. Framing will affect judging only if it greatly enhances or distracts from the photo.
- * Each entry must be clearly marked on the back with name, address and phone number of the photographer and the category in which it is entered. If photographer is under 18, age should be noted.

To Enter: Photos must be brought to the Fairgrounds in **Floral Hall** on Thursday, August 21st between 3:00 - 8:30 p.m. or Friday, August 22nd between 8:00 - 9:30 a.m. Photos and prizes must be picked up between 6:00 - 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 23rd. Judging will take place on Friday, August 22nd. All decisions of the judges are final.

CLASS A

CATTLE DEPARTMENT DAIRY AND BEEF

ALL CATTLE MUST BE SUPERVISED ATALL TIMES. Adult and youth will show their animals at the same time. Animals must be shown in the ring to be judged. Exhibitors should bring their own watering pails. There shall not be more than two entries in any one class by the same owner. Cattle must come from herds known to be free from common contagious diseases. Only disease-free cattle are permitted entry.

NOTE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 5 months of the event, Rabies vaccine between 30 days and 12 months for animals over 3 months of age, and Shipping Fever vaccination between 14 days and 6 months prior to the event are required. Out of state cattle imported into Vermont also require official individual identification and an import permit with a CVI dated within 30 days of entry.

Exhibitors are encouraged to leave their animals until 3:00 p.m. Saturday for the fair-goers to enjoy.

The fair turned 90 last year, and everyone involved put in a great deal of extra effort to ascertain it was done in style. Extraordinary exhibits and demonstrations took place in the gymnasium which was bustling with activity; and the items on display were truly incredible to see. We've been working hard to keep the fair exciting with fresh events that spark everyone's interest and participation. We'll continue to do so, and appreciate everyone's suggestions and enthusiasm on such matters.

It is with great enthusiasm to inform you that planning for the 2008 fair has already begun! Visit our website from time to time for breaking news on the upcoming fair at www.dvfair.com. It's a great source of information about the fair, the events, and a way to get many of the fair's forms.

The 90th Annual Deerfield Valley Farmers' Day Fair was held August 23rd - 26th 2007.

96 Wilmington residents participated in bringing in 1096 exhibits. 59% of the exhibitors at last year's fair were from Wilmington, however, their exhibits made up 63% of the total. This makes the Town of Wilmington the strongest exhibitor at the fair and also shows a great amount of pride in its work. Last year the fair paid over \$2,440 to exhibitors in premiums, and it's great fun for the kids! Let's see some more of that Wilmington pride at this year's fair!

The Fair's opening day was welcomed by comfortable temperatures under overcast skies, with the unveiling of a Truck Pull upon a greatly improved track. The truck pull attracted 61 participants and many more spectators. The Fair's Family Night continued to be a great success that allowed fairgoers a chance to ride all the rides between 6 and 10 pm with the purchase of a bracelet. The Talent Show/Contest offered competitive entertainment during the twilight hours.

The Fair continued on Friday with hotter weather. Friday was a lesser attended evening, allowing some Fairgoers to enjoy shorter lines on the midway, a checkers/cribbage tournament, an ox pull, and the Bluegrass Jam session.

On Saturday, we were blessed with unseasonably high temperatures in the mid-90's. Turnout was incredible despite the heat, and it was a difficult day for all to endure. Demonstrations of skills practiced 90 years before were offered in the gymnasium, a 90th Anniversary Scavenger Hunt, and tours to the Searsburg Windmill Facility were sponsored by GMP and PPM Energy. The Fair's traditional events and contests were also held which included the Sawing Competition, Farmer-For-A-Day, a Pie Eating Contest, and a PeeWee Midway. Participants of all ages competed in the horse show, cattle show, horse pulling, games, demonstrations and exhibition premiums.

Sunday was a pleasant reprieve from the heat with a hot dry day under mostly overcast skies. Many were able to enjoy the midway while taking a break from the roar of engines at the demolition derby.

The Fair Association is grateful to all participants and volunteers whose hard work and participation contribute to the continued success of the fair. It takes

thousands of hours and numerous people to put on the Fair each year. Many businesses and individuals donate prizes, materials and equipment. Few fairs remain within the State of Vermont, and this community as a whole deserves a pat on the back for keeping this traditional fair a part of our local history. We also thank the Wilmington Town Office, School District, Police, Fire, and Highway Departments who help out, as well as both Whitingham and Deerfield Valley Rescue. Thank you to the Town of Wilmington, which has contributed financially in providing police coverage, and to those individuals who worked the shifts on the Wilmington Police Department.

We welcome your ideas and comments for events and improvements to the Fair and/or your volunteer time at the fair to setup, operate, and clean up after the fun is over. 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
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
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
